In so doing the other evening I came across a forgotten friend (I hope you make friends with some of your books too). It had belonged to somebody who became a very special person in my life. In fact I think of her every day and she has been dead for nearly twenty years! It was published the year I was born and the inscription inside shows that she liked it so much she had bought it for herself. It is titled The Seasons and the Gardener and describes itself as a "Book by H. E.

Bates for Children" and it has lovely small drawings from nature by C.F. **Tunnicliffe** whom some of you may know. It still has its fly jacket and is a delight to hold in one's hand being beautifully produced and bound between good hard covers, amazingly in 1940 when book printing was becoming a luxury. It's price then was six shillings. The reason I am telling you about this small but precious volume is because within its pages it holds the gentle thoughts, expressions, and passions of my own childhood. Here is seemingly elderly **H. E. Bates** telling children that he wants to tell them about all the interesting things that go to make up a garden and the importance of beginning to learn about them when they are young. He guides them through the seasons and what to expect in each of them. He tells them what to look forward to and what to enjoy and how to get the best out of everything. At the end he sums it all up by saying what he has told the children is how they can make their own special place. He says he cannot do it for them because every Garden must be the expression of the person who makes it, be it elaborate or simple, formal or wild.

HERA report (Highpoint Estate Residents Association)

There is now a new notice board up on the estate and it looks great. Information about meetings and local issues and events will be displayed on it. HERA has received an update on how vehicles for the prison expansion will affect the **HERA** Estate. Road fill have ignored correspondence from HERA about repairs to the road on the estate, therefore HERA has told residents that this will no longer be going ahead. HERA had its first AGM meeting on 31st August which went well. The current elected members have stayed the same and the minutes will be up in the noticeboard. Their next meeting will be at Café 33 on 30th October at 7pm

Vehicle Activated Sign for Stradishall

Stradishall Parish Council has agreed to install three posts along the 30mph section of the B1063. Once the posts have been installed, the Parish Council will request a visit from a temporary *Vehicle Activated Sign* with a view to buying their own in 2023-24. Unfortunately, the criteria for using a **VAS** only allow them to be deployed on roads with a 30mph speed limit.

Highways concerns on the A143 near the Highpoint Estate

Stradishall Parish Council and **HERA** have several concerns about highways safety on the A143 near the Highpoint Estate following a recent spate of accidents. Suffolk County Council is the

local Highways authority, and any safety improvements must be agreed by them. Stradishall Parish Council asked about the possibility of introducing a 30 mph speed limit along the stretch of the A143 near the estate but have been told that a review of this section by Suffolk Highways shows that the existing speed limit is appropriate, and they would not consider a need to lower it at this time. Stradishall PC also asked about installing a pedestrian crossing on the A143 from the Highpoint Estate to the shop/café. The Parish Council is aware that this would be costly and would be a long-term project. The feedback from Suffolk County Council however is that it would be unlikely to support a crossing for several reasons:

The lack of an existing footway from the Highpoint Estate, on the A143 or Lancaster Way. Suffolk County Council cannot install a pedestrian crossing without proper footways leading to/from it.

Volume of pedestrian traffic. It is likely that this will not meet the criteria for a crossing. When looking at a potential site for a pedestrian crossing, one of the elements assessed is how many pedestrians cross, at what frequency and the average time waiting to cross safely versus vehicle speed/number. The works at Highpoint Prison are not expected to give rise to a particular increase in staff pedestrian traffic according to the most recent reports.

Existing speed limit. As Suffolk County Council considers the current 40mph limit appropriate for this section of the A143, they do not generally permit controlled pedestrian crossings on roads with a 40mph limit unless in exceptional circumstances.

High cost. If the 40mph speed limit were to be reduced to allow a crossing here, the cost of the Traffic Regulation Order for this, the footway construction required to site a crossing, plus the cost of the crossing itself would easily exceed £150,000.

This feedback is disappointing for the Parish Council and all the residents who visit the shops and café who must cross the A143 to get to them. 

'Ideal holiday reading' was the general feeling about **The Guest List**, a murder mystery by Lucy Foley: 'undemanding' 'easy reading' with enough intrigue to keep the reader keen and guessing until the very end – after which it will most likely be soon forgotten!

Friends and family are gathered at an exclusive venue on Cormorant Island off the coast of Ireland to celebrate the



wedding of golden couple Will, an up-andcoming TV star and Jules, a glamourous and ambitious magazine publisher. We know from the dramatic opening pages that things do not go well the wedding night ends in a raging storm, the

lights go out, a sense of heightened anxiety prevails amongst the guests trapped within the marquee, culminating in a 'scream of terror' from somewhere in the 'roaring darkness' outside. A bloodied body has been discovered and a murderer is at large. But this is not a straightforward whodunnit, for as the plot proceeds, we are not only trying to work out who the

villain is, but the identity of the victim is also not revealed until the end. The story is told from the alternative points of view of various members of the wedding party and flits back and forth in time from 'now – the wedding night' to 'earlier that day' to 'the day before'. As each character narrates their account we also go further back in time where we discover their secrets, jealousies, rivalries and betrayals. There's a lot going on and we thought it was very cleverly constructed although some complained it was a slow burn with the pace and suspense only picking up over halfway through. However, it's worth the wait. The momentum and excitement are really ratcheted up in the latter part- helped by the ever-shortening chapters - and with some carefully timed and surprising revelations everything falls, very nicely, into place in the final pages. That said, the more cynical amongst us were not convinced by the too many coincidences and found it all rather farfetched and overdone!

Something we did unanimously agree about was a dislike of all the characters! Particularly the obnoxious, misogynistic groomsmen (aptly described by one member but sadly not printable!) although their increasingly raucous behaviours are very effective in building up the tense and unsettling atmosphere. However, as someone astutely observed, the central character in the book is actually the island itself which has held its own disturbing secrets in its heaving, shifting peat bogs for hundreds of years. We thought the author does a skilful job in creating this dark and brooding anthropomorphic presence, populated by the ever-watchful cormorants, themselves 'a symbol of greed, bad luck and evil'. Whilst some were put off by the slow start and lack of empathy with the characters, we all stuck with it and were duly rewarded with sufficient thrills and spills to warrant having our credulity being stretched a bit! Stansfield is a beautiful village to live in but as it lies on two hillsides it can be so easily cut off by weather or other events beyond our control. Would you be willing to help? Either personally or by providing resources?


To be as prepared for unforeseen events as possible, Stansfield Parish Council is currently updating its Community Emergency Plan. This is at the request of W Suffolk Council's emergency planning team who are helping to draft it. A priority is to compile a list of volunteers and resources that are willing to be mobilised in the village in the event of an incident There is one qualified nurse in Stansfield ...but is she alone? And are there any trained First Aiders in the village willing to help in an emergency? Can you cook, wield a shovel, bring people to the community shelter (the Village Hall: postcode: CO108LW. What three words: builds. searching. bystander)? Volunteers who are part of the new village Good Neighbour Scheme will help, but anyone with skills or just a pair of willing hands would be welcomed.

Stansfield is blessed with many community minded volunteers and resources but needs to identify them. **The list will not be published**, simply kept by the emergency coordinators to contact volunteers and resource/ equipment owners and ask for their help if needed. Things like 4x4s, tractors, bulldozers, long ladders, chainsaws, ropes, fuel, gas bottles and batteries are obvious, but food stocks like tea, coffee, sugar, flour, water and cooking equipment, folding camp beds and blankets, BBQs, perhaps less so.

Communications that work without power might be vitally important, so we are looking for amateur radio enthusiasts and the like to come forward. We are also considering obtaining a two-way radio. A network of Emergency Plan Volunteers is also being drawn up to communicate with each area of the village, and again the Good Neighbour scheme volunteers will be important. If you would like to help your village, please volunteer or tell us what resources you have that might be useful and you would allow to be used in an emergency. Please contact: Cllr Pat Barnes 07942 282151, or any parish **councillor**. All Stansfield PC members who are part of the working party compiling the Community Emergency Plan are listed in leaflet distributed by the parish council to all households in Stansfield last month, which also gave useful numbers to ring for localised incidents, like power cuts, flooding ,potholes etc. Extra copies are available.

Rip, Fold and Scrumple – A Special Treat for Tiny Tots in Stansfield


This autumn the youngest residents in Stansfield will have the rare opportunity to be inspired by artists bringing a wonderful interactive show to the local village hall which has been

Country Cooking with Louise Mackrill

Right now, the orchard is dripping with apples & pears, the shooting season has begun and hearty root vegetables make an appearance.

Warm pear, walnut & Stilton salad for four people

This is a lovely warm salad for milder autumn days.

2 hard pears

1 ½ oz walnut pieces

3 oz stilton

1 tbsp walnut oil

½ oz butter

2 tbsp crème fraiche

1 egg yolk

Salad leaves

Cut the pears into quarters, core, leave the skins on, cut each quarter into 4 slices.



Heat some walnut oil in a pan and lightly

sauté the walnuts, remove & keep warm. Add the butter and sauté the pear slices for 2 or 3 minutes until golden, remove with a slotted spoon & keep warm. To make the sauce heat the crème fraiche in a small pan with most of the Stilton (keep a little back) until melting, whisk in the egg yolk until the sauce thickens but don't boil. Remove from heat. Divide the salad leaves between 4 plates, arrange the warm pears and walnuts around the leaves, crumble over the remaining stilton & pour over the warm sauce.

Crab-apple jelly

Now is the perfect time to make crabapple jelly as the game season has just begun and these are perfect partners. It is also a very good accompaniment to cheese. This is my mother's recipe and hers is the best!

4 lb crab-apples

2 pints water

Sugar (granulated or preserving)
Wash the crab-apples, cut into halves, do not peel or core. Put into a large pan along with the water, bring to the boil & simmer for 1 ½ hours until mashed, adding more water as required. Strain overnight through a jelly bag. Measure the juice extract then put into a pan with ¾ - 1 lb sugar per pint of juice. Stir over a low heat to dissolve the sugar, then boil briskly without stirring until you have a

'set' on testing. Pour into jars & cover.

Roast Partridge with crabapple jelly

Lean gamey partridge tastes especially good served with an autumn fruit preserve.

Wrap the partridges in streaky bacon and roast in a hot oven 200oC for 20 minutes, remove, glaze with crab-apple jelly, return to the oven for another 5 minutes only, remove and keep warm whilst you make the jus in the roasting tin over a medium heat.

Pour in some chicken stock and white wine, bubble away scraping any sediment off the bottom, until reduced. Stir in a tablespoon of crab-apple jelly. Spoon a little jus onto a serving plate, lay a partridge on top and accompany with lashings of bread sauce.

Butterscotch apples

This is to die for, serve with creamy rice



pudding and it will rise to the top of your favourite dessert list!
4 or 5 firm tart eating apples
2 oz unsalted butter
2 oz light brown sugar
Peel and core the apples and cut them into



½ inch dice. Melt the butter in a large frying pan and fry the apples very gently. After 2 minutes, sprinkle with the sugar then gently toss and fry for 12-15 minutes, until tender and glazed. Serve immediately with a generous dollop of hot rice pudding.

A repeat of the birthday bash last year, now entitled **The Sausage Fest**. Lots of friends, children, and dogs. The highlight, of course, was the new Olympic standard Water Slide for the munchkins which kept them occupied for a good while.

Majestic provided the following Bouvet Saphir '20 sparkler. Made from Chenin Blanc grapes, has 18m ageing and offers a creamy, peach, biscuity aroma. Drunk as an aperitif but it would go well with fish in a buttery sauce. 12.5% £12 on the 6-bottle thing.

Villa Maria 21/22. The usual gooseberry grapefruit NZ Sauvignon Blanc. Try it with spicy Asian food. We had this with the Crevettes from Mummery Brothers on Bury Market. 14% £10.

The Sausages, four different seasoning, all homemade were rapidly consumed with the following. Also, Majestic.

Note my comment after the following three wines. Chateau Arnauton 2014.A right bank wine from Fronsac with Merlot being the predominant grape. Red and black fruit flavours. A big powerful wine and probably best served with a Beef Wellington. 14% £13

Chateau Fourcas Dupré Listrac Médoc. A left bank wine. Cabernet Sauvignon led blend which was in oak barrels for 14months and years in bottle. Ripe red fruits and tannins subdued. Chicken, and pork, dishes. 13% £14

Chateau Cour D'Argent 2014 a Bordeaux Supérieur. Think black pepper and berries for this one, and grilled meats to accompany. 13% £12.

I always recommend drinking Bordeaux when it is as least 15 years old. None of these were and all would benefit from being cellared for several more years. A further three bottles to mention.

A rose well worth trying is Minuty '22. (Majestic). This is a very pale rose made from the Grenache grape. Refreshing but delicate with strawberry and peach flavours. The grapes are hand-picked, and this is one of only 18 Cru Classe Rose's from Provence.

13% £15. Worth splashing out for this one

At the Open Garden Day, I was presented with a bottle by a lady from Stansfield who was helping at that event. It was a Siglo Gran Reserva 2015 famiglia Fernandez De Manzanos. A Rioja made from Tempranillo, Grenache and Graciano grapes. It spent three years in cask and several more in bottle. A very elegant, complex wine showing black fruit, black pepper notes to it. Smooth and rounded and full bodied. A serious wine. 13.5%. I am unfamiliar with this producer, but they have several outlets in the UK. Look for Bodegas Manzanos online. Wine World being one of them, I intend to.

Finally, I received an email from a friend asking what to do with a bottle of Ruinart Vintage Champagne '93. I said to drink it with a lightly poached Salmon with a bland sauce. There would be very delicate aromas with a hint of nuttiness to it. No reports back yet but it will/would have been an absolute treat.



My name is Alex Ager, I am a 29-yearold who has lived on and off with Epilepsy since the age of 5. Back in April 2021 to help to try and



control my seizure activity I chose to give up work. I had also been very tired during recovery from the seizures. It had taken me almost a year to realise that the daily working activity had been causing me stress and anxiety, not being able to fulfil everyday tasks... I take pride in my work, so this was very difficult for me. I continue to cope with epilepsy, which is

being controlled by medication. I'm now back working voluntarily at Castle Manor Academy. This is helping me with not only my personal well-being but my confidence and social interaction with supportive colleagues.

Recently I've trained hard to complete an organised 25km walk with my parents

YOUR CARAID NEEDS YOU - VOLUNTEER DRIVERS

If you have seen the regular reports on CLASP CarAid in this monthly magazine, you will be aware that more volunteer drivers are needed to continue to provide the ever increasing demands for its service to your community. Last month we made 48 trips, compared with only 10 in June 2018. At the moment CarAid only has one volunteer driver living in your area, meaning that requests for medical visit trips have to be met using drivers from Clare, regularly creating



organisational difficulties. Please consider becoming a CarAid Volunteer Driver. This is not an onerous commitment and may only require one or two trips per month and our drivers all say how much pleasure they get from helping and meeting others. CLASP Committee Meeting Summary Thursday 14 August 2023

The monthly demand for CarAid services continues to be significantly increased compared with previous years. Also noticeable are the increasing logistically difficult and time consuming trips we are being asked to complete. We recently had a request to take an elderly lady to WSH, who needed wheelchair assistance as well as a lady driver assistant to push her into the hospital. Now that the special assistance provided for Allie Godwin has ended, taking her each weekday for six weeks to Addenbrookes for brain tumour treatment, I am able to report that one of Allie's friends has made a very generous cash donation to CarAid. Word of Warning. A driver who took a client to Newmedica in Bury failed to pay for parking and has received a £100 fine. If you take a client to Newmedica please let me know the parking fee paid and I will add it to the mileage cost for reimbursement. FYI. After many years service Colin Barrable has retired from the role of CLASP Treasurer. Many thanks to Colin for his invaluable service over the years. John Knight has taken over as the new Treasurer. However, for the time being, Colin will continue to be the drop off point for CarAid contribution envelopes.

Ongoing interesting CarAid statistic: Since April 2018, CarAid has helped 204 different clients, making 1,280 trips.

As we enter Autumn everything begins to quieten down on the farm, we are now produce strong lambs in the spring. preparing the ewes for the mat-

Good teeth are vital for being able to eat grass and tough forage such as hay over the winter months, so they can eat enough to produce the energy their bodies will need to grow lambs over the toughest months of the year.

We then check their udders, making sure there are no lumps and that they are in a general good condition. They need good udders to be able to produce good quantities of milk for their lambs in the spring, with bad udders it will fall to us to feed their lambs.

Finally, we check their body condition, making sure they are not too skinny or too fat before they are mated, either of these can cause problems while carrying the lambs over the winter.

The ewes need to be in a good condition before mating, we then need to maintain this condition over the winter to ensure they have the energy they need to give birth to their lambs in the spring. Any ewes with bad teeth, udders or bad body condition will become pets.

We perform a ewe MOT – this is where we check their teeth, udders and general body condition to ensure they are fit and strong to carry lambs over the winter and

health, and that they have teeth to maintain their body condition. Most rams will be so focussed on their job of serving the ewes they don't have time to eat!



So generally loose condition over the winter, ensuring they are in peak body condition before they start is very important, so they have extra reserves to

While we get the ewes and rams ready for the mating season the lambs born earlier this year are happily grazing in the paddocks, gaining weight with all of the grass we have had this summer.

We will be at Horringer farmers market with fresh lamb on Saturday 7TH October, 9:30am-12:30 – do come along and say

Pigs: we are sending our pigs off in batches this year. Two went in September with the remaining 4 leaving us in October and November.

We have sold out this year via word of mouth, our pork does have a good flavour, and this has certainly been recognised locally. We have placed an order for more weaners (8-week-old piglets) to arrive in January. We will need to move them to a paddock that has not had pigs on it for at least 6 months, this is to avoid cross contamination of bacteria.

Chickens: mum has almost won the fight against the crows. They still manage to get one or two eggs, but by hanging up big yellow balls with red eyes on and string door curtains to the entrances, the crows seem nervous to enter the coops now and are leaving them alone.

Mum is now receiving more and more text alerts for Avian Flu and expects lockdown will be announced in October as it has in previous years.

She is busy planning how to keep her birds safe. Much of the set up from last year remains and with some small tweaks



We have been busy rounding up the sheep and checking their condition ready for the tupping.

This will mean the majority of the lambs will be born in March when the weather is a little kinder and the grass has begun to grow. We also need to check the rams over to ensure they are fit for mating, checking their teeth, testicles, and body condition.

The same as the ewes - making sure the rams are in good

Weston and Simpkin joined the attack and while the former captured no wickets, he bowled tightly, keeping the Chippenham boys at bay. Simpkin continued where he left off in the previous game by taking two wickets, one a quite spectacular flying catch by McElhinney.

Chippenham ended 133 all out; a superb effort in the field, with solid contributions from all, leaving SCC an achievable target.

Tea! Ann and Marilyn's quality shone through once more: 5 varieties of sandwich, 8 different cakes, crudites, crisps - the works! Stansfield CC is truly blessed.

Now the homesters turn to bat. Blows and Patullo strode purposefully to the middle. Blows returned moments later, plumb LBW, for a quick-fire 7. Enter McElhinney, quickly into his stride. At the other end Patullo did well, though several shots didn't quite make the boundary, necessitating additional effort between the wickets to keep the scoreboard turning. McElhinney hit several through leg for 4 and a sumptuous




straight drive back over the despairing bowler, before missing a straight one - out for 21.

Stone replaced him, intent on hitting only boundaries, but his promising innings closed prematurely on 21, leaving Stansfield in the danger zone at 47-3. Patullo departed reluctantly for a wellfought 7, out LBW, confused by a ball that he thought pitched outside leg, but which actually pitched on leg stump and would have taken out middle and leg.....

KP came to the crease, his previous knock of 45 clearly etched in his mind, as he swung and missed, and marched back to the pavilion for 3.Cooray, shop-fresh willow in hand, hit the ground running. Alas, lady luck was not on his side, ending as the third batsman to make 21 that day.

At 103-6, the match balanced on a knife edge, Simpkin and O'Connell faced a Chippenham barrage. Some entertaining bazball-esque antics saw the pair bring Stansfield to the brink. Simpkin fell for 17, leaving Weston to join O'Connell (13 not out) to win the match, creaming one through leg side for 4. An all-round team effort and a second consecutive win against Chippenham. Unusual fire risk in a house

John Fellows sent this cautionary tale I recently found several burn marks on the inner part of the right hand upright (see photo) on an upstairs window frame. These were quite severe and were some 2mm in depth. Scorch marks were also apparent on the adjacent frame. I was unable to determine what had caused this, until my daughter told me that when staying here for a few days, she had removed a 20 cm



mirror from the windowsill, which my wife had previously kept on her dressing table. Having discussed this with Suffolk Fire and Rescue it would appear that by far the most likely cause of the burning was the sun's rays being focussed on the window frame by the mirror concentrating the heat sufficient to cause the damage. They recommend that all south facing windows be checked and to remove

any mirrors, or other objects which may reflect heat and cause fires. For further advice on this, and other useful instructions on how to avoid fires, go to the F & R website: www.suffolk.gov.uk>Suffolk-fire-and rescue-service.

The Renters (Reform) Bill 2023

The purpose of the bill is to end 'no fault evictions' and to enable greater stability for those who are in private rented accommodation. The benefit envisioned by Theresa May back in April 2019, was that landlords would 'no longer be able to unexpectedly evict families with only 8 weeks' notice'. The main thrust of the proposed reform is to do away with Section 21 Notices which can be given by landlords to assured shorthold tenants to require them to leave without there being any specific reason. Under the proposed bill, landlords will only be able to seek an eviction if they have statutory grounds, which will include reasons like rent

arrears or causing a nuisance or perhaps if the landlord wants to move into the property themselves. Assured shorthold tenancies will be abolished, with the vast majority of private renters obtaining the similar security of tenure as those that rent from a Housing Association. Once the reforms take effect, fixed term assured tenancies will also be abolished and all tenancies will be 'periodic'. The concern for families is that not all private sector tenants will enjoy equal security of tenure because not all landlords are of the same type. Much more security could be expected if the landlord is an institution like an

investment fund as they may be less likely to sell a property than a private individual. The court's power to transfer a tenancy under Schedule 7 to the Family Law Act remains, and the Family Court is reminded that the landlord must be invited to make representations before ordering a transfer of a tenancy, perhaps to an individual they don't want as a tenant.

The bill is at the early stages and may not be passed until early 2024.

In September 2022, it was rated outstanding by the Care Quality Commission. Louise Broddle, CQC head of adult social care inspection, said: "Headway Suffolk is clearly an important part of the community and other services can look to it as an example of how to deliver outstanding care and support."

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

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Wickhambrook Local History Society News September 2023

Geoffrey Kay's talk, entitled 'Overpaid, Oversexed and Over Here' was subtitled 'The Friendly Invasion' and that seems to me to be a kinder description of the events



in East Anglia during the Second World War. Over three million American troops came to Britain during the war and 26,000 lives were lost. It was a huge logistical operation as plans were made for D-Day and the bombing of Germany. Troops

were given an instruction booklet on how to order drinks in pubs, how to treat women and how the money system worked among other things and although there was some tension between the British people and the white American airmen and their black counterparts, most villages welcomed the visitors and appreciated their help in winning the war. Geoffrey started his talk by asking the members if any of them were able to remember the early 1940s and this produced many stories from those who were small children at the time. They remembered parties at the air bases and the generosity of the men. One lady has a bracelet with a dime on it which was given to her by one of the Americans who visited her home.

Geoffrey told us the story of Sam Hurry, who was ten years old and was 'adopted' by the men at Thorpe Abbots airfield. They let him start the planes, took him to London for a treat and bought school uniform for him when he passed his 11+ and his parents could not afford it.

He also told us of John T Appleby, an American night fighter, who spent an idyllic summer visiting churches, going to concerts and enjoying the whole Suffolk experience. His book, Suffolk Summer, details all of this and the royalties from the book still help to pay for the upkeep of the Memorial Rose Garden in the Abbey Gardens in Bury St Edmunds. Glen Miller, James Stewart, James Cagney and Jo Louis were among the celebrities who served in East Anglia. One of our members' mothers remembered James Stewart being at dances at Old Buckenham! An excellent talk, brought to life by Geoffrey and the members. Our next meeting is on Tuesday 17th October, 7.30pm in the WI Hall when Christopher Parkinson will talk on East Anglian Stained Glass windows.


